Abercrombie & Kent Philanthropy

Abercrombie & Kent Philanthropy (AKP) supports schools in Arusha, Tarangire and the Ngorongoro Conservation Area through its Safe Water for Schools Initiative. The program brings LifeStraw filters to remote schools giving students and teachers access to clean drinking water.

AKP has also set up two Women's Bike Shops, one in Tarangire and the other in Karatu. They have empowered disadvantaged women by teaching them to become bike mechanics as well as empowering the local community through mobility.

Kope Lion

Human-wildlife conflict is increasing across the world. The human population is growing so the demand for suitable farmland has a negative affect on wildlife areas. Kope Lion has set out to mitigate this conflict in the Ngorongoro Conservation Area as well as introduce new blood into the lion population in the crater which has become cut off. Shanga Workshop

Step into the world of glassblowing at the Shanga Workshop and meet the artisans, each of whom have a disability making regular work unattainable for them. Learn to blow glass or make a necklace and spend some time interacting with these incredible people.



Nature Walks

Safari generally means a lot of time in a vehicle so heading out on a nature walk provides a welcome opportunity to stretch ones legs and observe the smaller, but no less fascinating, creatures.

Walking Safaris

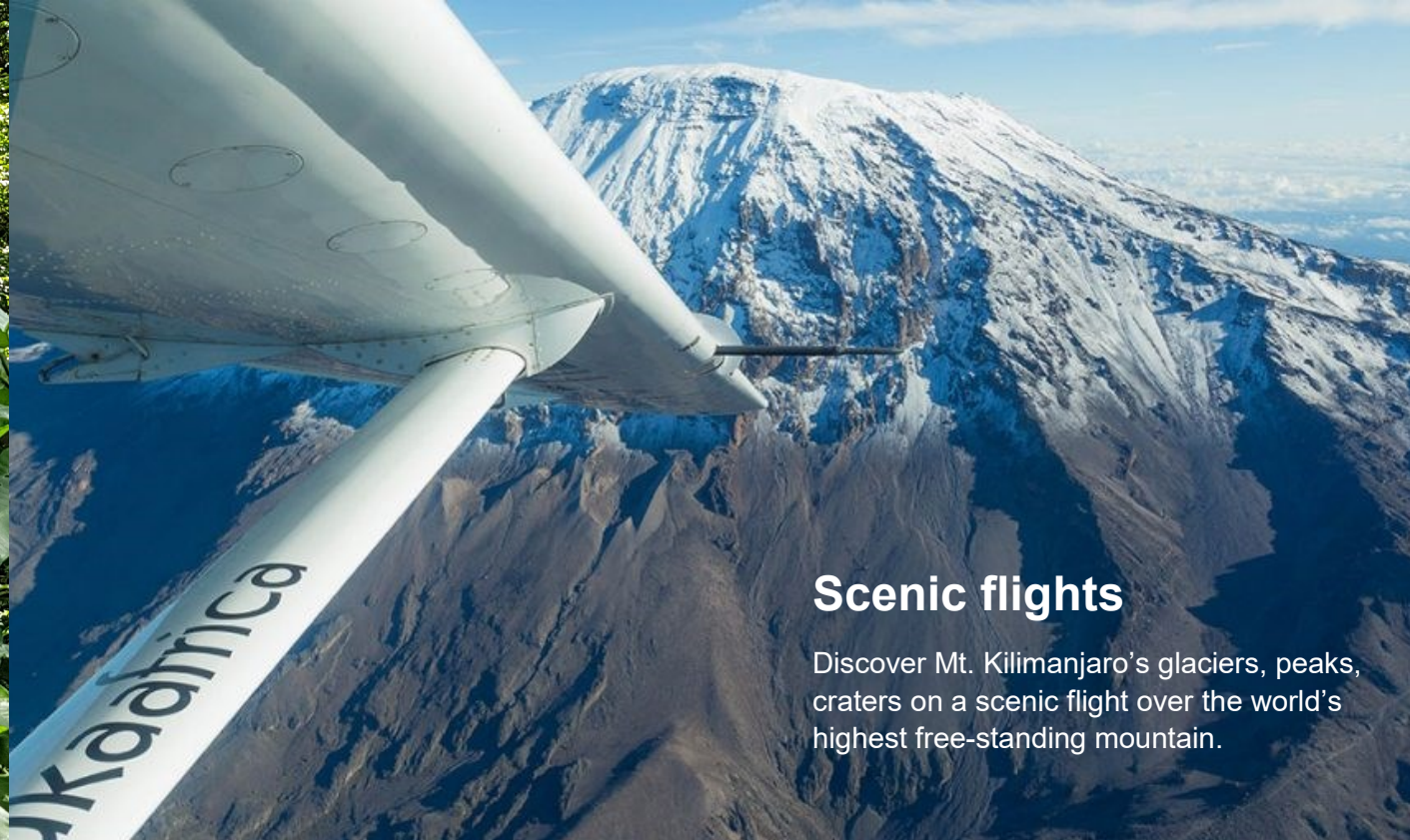


Mount Meru & Kilimanjaro Day Hikes

Discover Mt. Kilimanjaro's glaciers, peaks, craters on a scenic flight over the world's highest free-standing mountain.

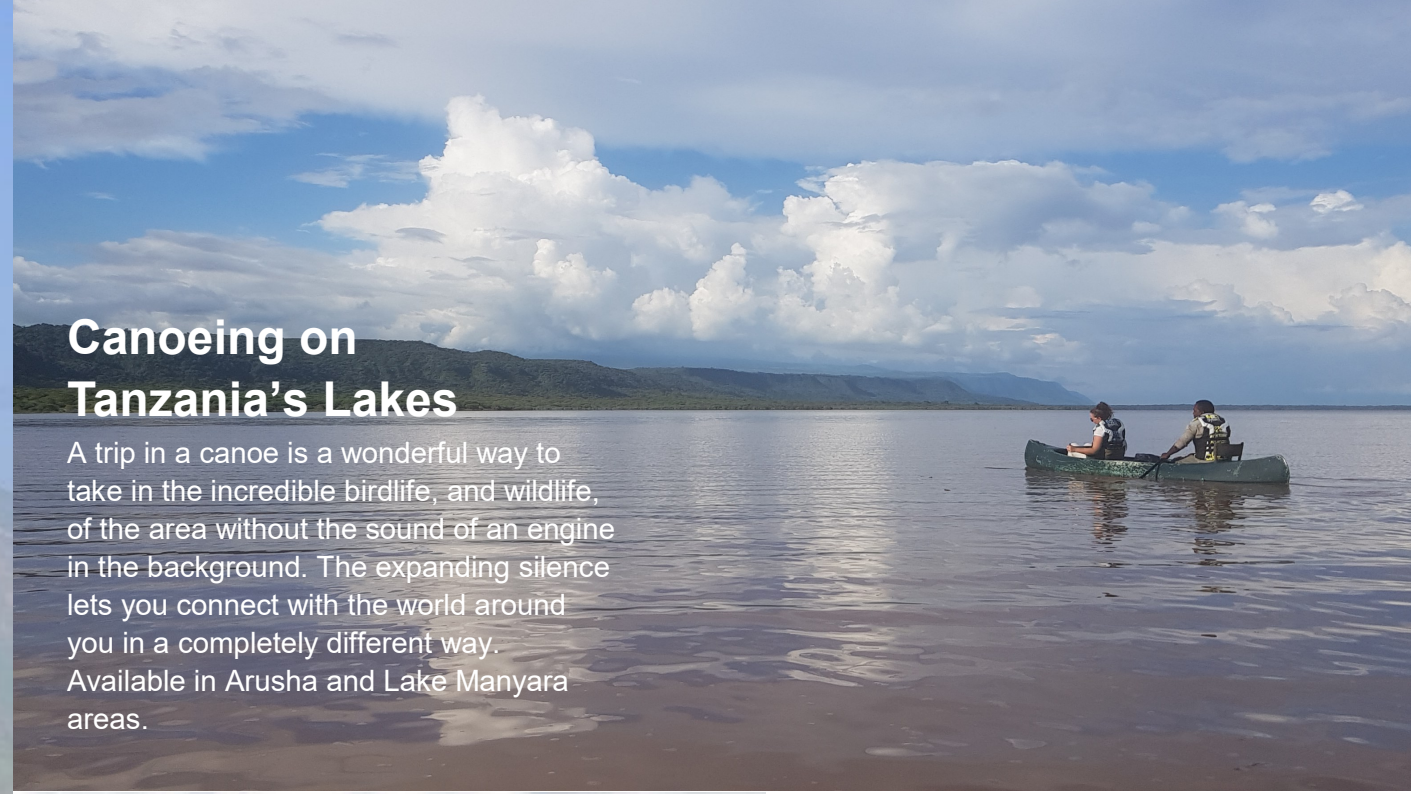
Horse Riding Adventures

Canoeing on Tanzania's Lakes

A trip in a canoe is a wonderful way to take in the incredible birdlife, and wildlife, of the area without the sound of an engine in the background. The expanding silence lets you connect with the world around you in a completely different way. Available in Arusha and Lake Manyara areas.



Mountain Biking

The two wheels of a mountain bike give you the opportunity to get off the beaten track and into some of the more remote areas of a village or park. There are lots of riding options such as easy flat rides exploring a local village and along the edge of Lake Manyara.



Cultural Encounters

Tanzania is made up of 120 different tribes each of which have their own fascinating culture and ancient traditions. Many of the tribes now live a more 'modern' life style however there are a few which still follow the teachings of their forefathers.

Iraqw tribe (pronounced Irow)

Residing in the foothills of the Ngorongoro Crater a visit to Mzee Daniel Tewa's house will provide you with a fascinating insight into this lesser known tribe of Tanzania.

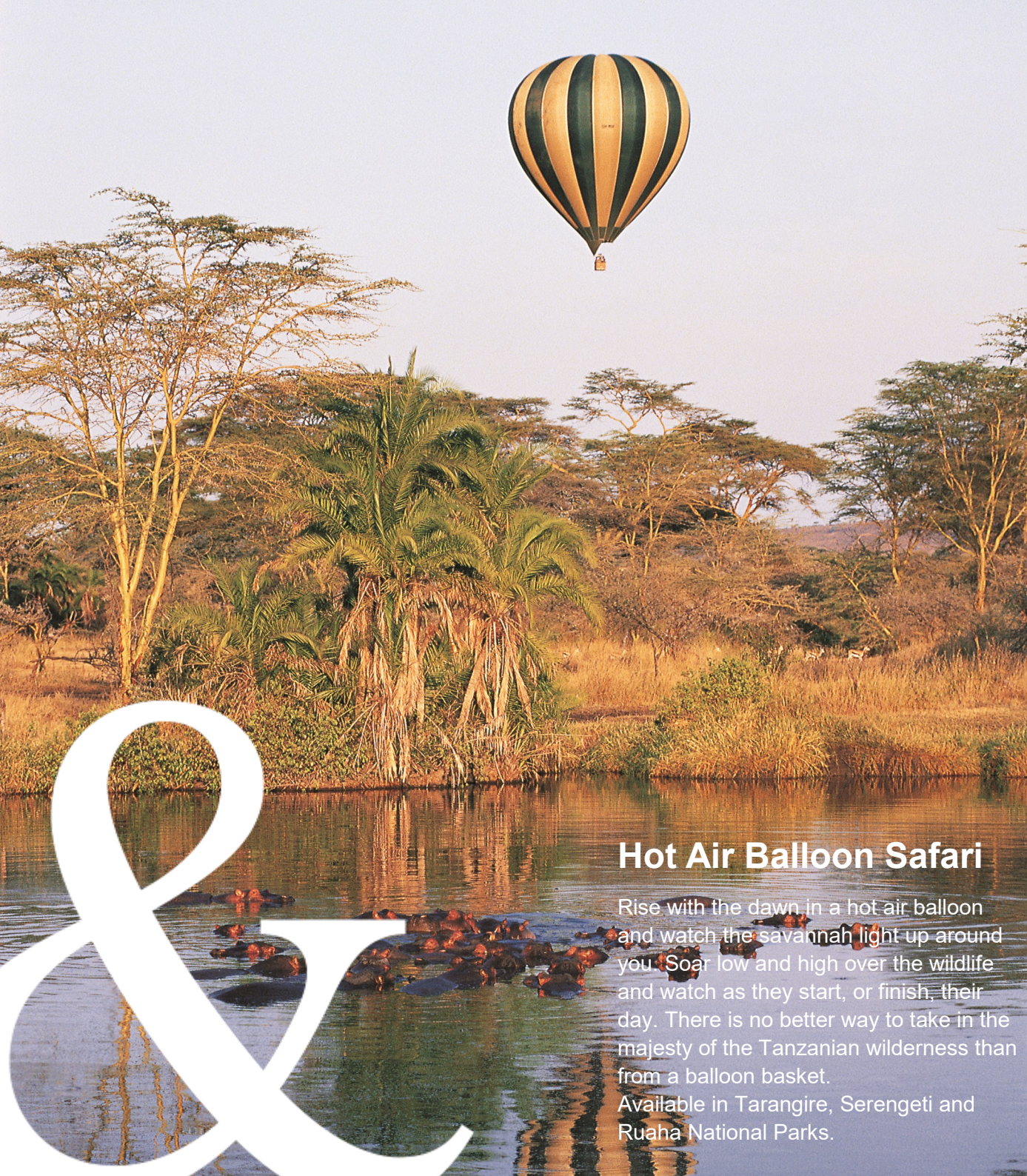
Hadzabe, Datoga and Blacksmiths

The area around Lake Eyasi is home to these three tribes. The Hadzabe are the last hunter gatherers left in Tanzania and you are welcome to join them on a morning hunt. The Datoga are pastoralists and similar to the Masai in nature and the Blacksmiths live up to their name creating weapons and jewellery for the other tribes in the area.

The Masai

Perhaps the most famous of East Africa's tribes the Masai are known for their colourful shukas (cloth), beautiful beadwork and outstanding jumping skills. Explore a village and see how they have held true to their traditions, and how these are now changing with the modern world.





Hot Air Balloon Safari

Rise with the dawn in a hot air balloon and watch the savannah light up around you. Soar low and high over the wildlife and watch as they start, or finish, their day. There is no better way to take in the majesty of the Tanzanian wilderness than from a balloon basket. Available in Tarangire, Serengeti and Ruaha National Parks.



Tuk Tuk Ride

Cruise through the narrow tracks of the village of Mto wa Mbu like a local in a tuk tuk (rickshaw). These three wheeler vehicles are the perfect way to get off the beaten track into the more rural parts of the village where you can see how the locals grow their crops, build their houses and even brew their beer.

Safari Blue

Set out on the Indian Ocean from the island of Zanzibar on a day Sea Safari - discover the magical underwater world that lie along the coral reefs and, if you are lucky, swim with the resident dolphins. Have lunch on a remote sandbank or beach and let the sound of the sea wash away your worries.





Explore Stone Town

Stone Town has a long, dark, yet fascinating history. Explore the narrow winding streets, walk through the old slave market and cathedral and admire the sturdy defenses of the fort all the whilst taking in the centuries of history.



Spice Farm

Ever wondered how the spices you buy at home are grown and harvested? Find out first hand on this fascinating visit to a small spice farm on Zanzibar. Enjoy guessing which spices they are, see how they are harvested then, if you are inclined, indulge in a cooking lesson and learn how to use them at home.



Jozani Forest & Butterfly Centre

Home to the red colobus monkey, endemic to the island, the Jozani Forest is a cool, magical place to discover. Wind your way through the forest and onto the mangrove boardwalk before visiting the butterfly center and getting a close up view of these delicate creatures.

1000 Hands of Zanzibar

Immerse yourself into the culture of Zanzibar on this fascinating tour of the village; see how the local dhows (sailing boats) are constructed, visit the fish market and the artisans that make innumerable items out of palm leaves and finally visit the turtle sanctuary and see what is being done to save this special species.



Discover Prison Island

A short boat ride from Stone Town lies prison Island - built by the British then used as a quarantine hospital this island has a deep history. Today the primary residents are giant tortoises who were brought from the Seychelles as part of a conservation project.



Sunset Dhow Cruise

There is no better way to end a day by the sea than on a traditional dhow (sailing boat). Board the boat in the late afternoon and set out under sail into the sea; enjoy your favourite drink on board whilst watching the sun sink below the horizon and light up the sky with that special glow.





Dar es Salaam City Tour

Spend the morning exploring the city of Dar es Salaam—start at the National Museum before moving onto the Cultural Village Museum. Finally stop in at the Tinga Tinga artists before having lunch at a local restaurant.



Explore Bagamoyo

Originally the capital of German East Africa Bagamoyo provides a window into East Africa's colonial history. Walk through the old fort and through to the Kaole ruins on the edge of the city where the original port was located.
